CARING FOR OTHERS **IN A TIME OF** CRISIS

In the face of the COVID-19 crisis, our members have found a multitude of opportunities to offer fellowship and aid to friends, neighbors and local health care workers. Here are the stories of just a few such efforts.

Gizeh Shriners

British Columbia and Yukon, Canada

The Gizeh Drum and Bugle Corps Unit performed a socially distanced concert for the residents of Lakeshore Care Centre, a long-term care facility. The outdoor show featured a collection of tunes put together by Musical Director Wayne Reese. Afterward, the Lakeshore Care Centre staff provided a pizza lunch to show their appreciation.

Members of Cowichan Valley Shrine Club served meals to health care workers at Cowichan District Hospital. They set up in the employee parking lot, timing their efforts to coincide with the various shift changes, and cooked hotdogs and hamburgers. The club was able to feed approximately 350 people.

Noble Rick Mellson is one of the chairs of the club's Cook Wagon committee. "We just want to give back to them and to give back to the community that supports us so well," he said.

"All of us thought it's something we should do for the staff," said III. Sir Harold Wallace. "We are a community organization and we want to be able to give something back to the staff who are working their tails off for us."





El Zagal Shriners

Fargo, North Dakota

Since March, Misfits BBQ of El Zagal has been supporting the temple, nobility, community and health care workers by providing nourishment in the form of delicious barbecue meals.

"We had a Shrine Temple that was closed," said Potentate Mike Dow. "We wanted to generate some revenue and help others. We provided meals to members in distress and families in distress. At one of our weekend barbecues, we gave away several meals to health care workers."



Dow said it was a perfect way to stay in contact with nobles, without contact.

"Many people were getting weary of cooking at home," said Imperial Sir Matt Sturlaugson. "We would barbecue

ribs, pork butts, brisket and pork loins. We set up in our temple parking lot with drive-through, no-contact serving. People would order in advance, pay online or at the event and have their main course for supper done for them."

The Misfits raised funds for the temple administration to help defray costs through the pandemic. "We now are looking to use some profits to help nobles and units and clubs in distress," Sturlaugson said.

No one does a parade better than Shriners. So, when the community planned an outdoor, socially distanced celebration for a woman's 90th birthday, Edna Mosby specifically requested the Shriners be part of it. Seeing the Shriners had always been Edna's favorite part of a parade.

The Virus Threat Completely Changed the Annual Meeting of our Organizations

A Special Session

The COVID-19 pandemic has disrupted countless events the world over - including the biggest event of the year for Shriners International — Imperial Session.

The annual convention typically covers several days and is a time for fellow nobles and their families to gather for fun and fellowship, as well as the time for the required election of officers for the coming year, and the passing of legislation that affects the direction of both the fraternity and the health care system. Our leadership met the unexpected challenge nearly flawlessly.

Making Alternative Plans

Written balloting on changes to the bylaws to permit holding a virtual special session concluded on June 13, 2020. All of the measures necessary to proceed with the planned special session were adopted. We received 634 responses from the lowa Representatives and 1,215 responses from the Colorado Members which met the requirement of 150 — the quorum requirement under either the Iowa or Colorado Corporation bylaws.

Using a combination of pre-recorded audio and video clips, live streaming and a variety of electronic programs and platforms, much was accomplished in the one-day online event. Voting was conducted; nominations, reports and motions were heard; positions were accepted; new officers were fezzed and officers were installed. In addition, Imperial Sir Jeff Sowder and Lady Cheryl gave closing remarks, and Imperial Sir Jim Smith and Lady Alice gave their first statements as Imperial Potentate and First Lady. In addition, a video of her fundraising program, Rising Stars, was shown. Finally, our new National Patient Ambassadors, Mia and Connor, were introduced.

New Legislation

Legislation to allow Abou Saad, Al Rai'e Saleh, Amal, Anezeh, Bolivia and Hikmat Shriners to form and become charter members of the Latin American Shrine Association was passed, and the charter was granted. This is the first new Shrine Association in more than 50 years. Legislation needed to hold the 2024 Imperial Session in Reno, Nevada, also passed. Both pieces of legislation were adopted through unanimous consent. A majority vote was required for adoption.

This Special Session took considerable planning and technological knowledge and ability to execute. We appreciate the efforts and expertise of everyone involved, and congratulate them on a successful event. Temples served as hosts to voting delegates, providing assistance with the technology used to view the Special Session.

The Imperial Year

On July 29, a Facebook live event was held, A Look at the New Imperial Year, featuring the premiere of the National Patient Ambassadors video, Through Darkness I Shine. Also shown were many of the speeches and videos from the Special Session, in order to ensure that as many fraternity members as possible, and their ladies, had the opportunity to view this important material.

A Word About the Award of Merit

One of the highlights of every Imperial Session is the presentation of the Award of Merit by the Imperial Potentate. It is the highest honor the fraternity has for nobles, and is meant to honor individuals for outstanding service to our fraternity and philanthropy. While those who would have received this award for the Imperial year that just concluded have been selected, the decision was made to wait until next year's public opening in Houston to make them known. This will allow the presentation to be made in a more traditional manner with the normal large gathering of nobles and ladies in attendance to congratulate these outstanding men.



JAMES R. "JIM" SMITH ELECTED IMPERIAL POTENTATE

A Ben Hur Shriner Will Lead the Fraternity for the 2020-2021 Imperial Year

★ James R. "Jim" Smith of Georgetown, Texas, was elected Imperial Potentate, part of the 12-member body that helps govern the Shriners fraternity, in Tampa, Florida, on July 11, 2020. He is serving his 10th year as a member of the Boards of Directors for Shriners International and Shriners Hospitals for Children.

Smith became a member of the Imperial line to make a difference. "I really thought I could help," he said. "We need to strengthen the temples and ensure they are places where people want to go, and are welcomed. We have to make it attractive to join. To put it in business terms, we need to offer a better product."

His Masonic Journey

Smith became a Mason on Feb. 13, 1999, and a Shriner in 2004. He joined the fraternity as a way to acknowledge and give back to the organizations that assisted a nephew who had orthopaedic difficulties, and received care at Shriners Hospitals for Children — Chicago throughout his childhood.

Smith joined Zor Shriners in Madison, Wisconsin. When the family moved to Georgetown, Texas, he joined Ben Hur Shriners in Austin where he participated in the Provost Guard and helped transport children to and from the Texas Shriners Hospitals. He also was a member of the Board of Governors for the Houston Shriners Hospital.

In 2009, Smith served as Potentate of Ben Hur Shriners. That year, the temple had a balanced budget for the first time in many years and was awarded a Gold Membership Award for a net gain in membership. It was the first time Ben Hur Shriners had achieved gold status in 38 years.

Fun and Fellowship

Smith believes the fraternity needs to emphasize and focus on its original purpose of bringing fun and fellowship to a Masonic organization.

"When the Shriners fraternity started in 1872, its purpose was fun and fellowship," said Smith. "We did well with that — but we've lost our focus. As Imperial Potentate, I will try to put Fun and Fellowship back in the fraternity."

Smith has established a Fun and Fellowship Council to help find ways for "Nobles and ladies to have a good time."



Family, Faith and Education

A native of Racine, Wisconsin, Smith spent his childhood summers on his father's family farm. "I really enjoyed that time. It was a great way to be raised," he said.

Growing up, the importance of family and faith were deeply instilled — to this day, he continues to uphold the conservative values and Lutheran faith of his family.

Smith received his bachelor's degree in Business Administration from the University of Wisconsin. He studied for his MBA at the Keller School of Management in Chicago.

The Smith Family

Mary Lou Jones and Alice Smith shared a classroom when both were young teachers. Her husband, Bob Jones, was a friend of Jim Smith and arranged a blind date to bring the future Mr. and Mrs. Smith together. Jim and Alice were married 10 months later in Alice's hometown of Kilkenny, Minnesota, and celebrated their 48th wedding anniversary in August.

As Jim's career with a conveyor systems company progressed, the family moved quite often, mostly to various cities in Wisconsin and Minnesota, but they also spent time in Illinois and on the East Coast. Eventually, they purchased a fuel company in Phillips, Wisconsin, which was their last move before retiring to Georgetown, Texas.

The Smiths have a son, Jason, and a daughter, Abby, and five grandchildren. The fraternal tradition will continue in the Smith family for at least the next generation — both Jason and Abby's husband, Greg, are Shriners.

CONNOR, 14, was born with a bilateral incomplete cleft lip and complete cleft palate involving the hard and soft palate. As a newborn, his condition was so severe that he was unable to create the suction needed to feed. By the time he was 3 weeks old, he was failing to gain weight and was about to be admitted to a hospital. That's when a friend who was also a Shriner recommended the family contact Shriners Hospitals for Children — Chicago.

There, his RN care coordinator gave Connor's mother, Kelly, a special syringe, making it possible for her to finally feed her baby. From that moment, Connor began an extensive treatment plan of surgeries and interventions that will continue until he is 21, so that some repairs can be made after he has stopped growing.

Connor's condition affects not only his teeth and his ability to eat, but also his speech, hearing, and social and emotional well-being. In addition, Connor has a connective tissue disorder that eventually made it difficult for the active teen to participate in contact sports.

Connor's can-do spirit and supportive family have helped him find many ways to pursue his passions. Connor umpires for youth baseball, acts as a physical education mentor for other kids with disabilities at his school, and is an advocate and community volunteer. But above all else, Connor is a golfer. He maintains a busy training schedule and hopes to one day become a pro. Along with his family, Connor is part of a large local annual fundraiser, a golf tournament that has raised more than \$200,000 over the years for Shriners Hospitals for Children.

"I want kids to know that no matter what they look like, or how they walk, or what makes them different — that they shouldn't let anyone else make them feel bad," Connor said. "I want to help other kids feel good about themselves and their differences."

MIA, 16, was born with a severe case of infantile idiopathic scoliosis. Her journey with Shriners Hospitals for Children began at age 2, when she was first seen at the St. Louis location. Mia's treatments have included halo traction to gradually straighten and stretch her spine, as well as nearly 20 surgeries.

During her extensive time in the hospital, Mia and her care team developed a tight bond, and Mia considers the people she knows at Shriners Hospitals - her doctors, nurses, therapists and even the security guard — family. She has served as a patient ambassador for Shriners Hospitals for Children - St. Louis since she was 4 and has appeared in promotional videos and media interviews. Mia's passion is theater and singing, and she was featured singing I'll Be Home for Christmas in our holiday commercials. Mia is also part of the Shriners children's choir that performed in the recording of Foreigner's new version of their hit song I Want to Know What Love Is.

"I am so honored to be in this position," Mia said. "For as long as I can remember, I have always loved Shriners Hospitals. Not just because of the life it has given me, but the real love that comes from it. This community consists of the best people, and it truly makes my heart soar to know I'm a large part of it."

Rising Stars Helps Patients Discover Their Potential

We are all proud of Shriners Hospitals for Children's commitment to providing wrap-around care - maintaining a family-centered approach and caring for our patients' overall health and well-being.

This can mean different things for different patients. It can include finding ways to help them play with their friends, enhance their education, enjoy a hobby and live more independently.

"For many children, reaching their goals is often possible, but they may need to approach them in a different way," said First Lady Alice Smith. "Sometimes an assistive device can make all the difference. In my program, Rising Stars, I want to highlight the ways that Shriners Hospitals help kids realize their potential by providing assistive devices and other support."

Treating Unique Needs

For some kids, independence means that they want to be able to feed or dress themselves. Shriners Hospitals therapists help with that by evaluating each patient individually and working to find or create a custom tool, such as cutlery for persons with a hand or limb difference or devices to assist with dressing or grooming for persons with limited use of upper extremities.

Other assistive devices are mobility aids, such as crutches, walkers and wheelchairs that help patients learn to walk or regain that ability and to move about independently. There are also computer-driven augmentations to help those with speech and communication difficulties.

Integrating Technology

We also use assistive technology in our therapy programs, through the availability of various systems such as body weight supported gait training and functional electrical stimulation bikes. To help patients enjoy a higher quality of life, we also provide, or make families aware of, adaptive recreation opportunities and items to provide additional kid-friendly mobility, such as adaptive toy cars or bikes.

MEET OUR OLDEST LIVING PATIENT

Irene Was Treated at the Original Twin Cities Hospital in Minnesota

The impact that Shriners Hospitals for Children has reverberates through generations. This was especially evident at a very special celebration earlier this year — Irene Hand Roberts, who is believed to be our oldest living Shriners Hospitals for Children patient, turned 103.

As a surprise for Irene, Shriners Hospitals for Children patients and staff put together a video with well wishes and a message from (then) Imperial Potentate Jeffrey Sowder. Irene, who resides in a senior living community in Helena, Montana, was also treated to a pair of drive-by birthday parties. Family members shared the experience with her outside, and gifts and her favorite meals were delivered.

Irene was born on April 28, 1917, at her grandmother's restaurant and boarding hotel in McLaughlin, South Dakota. Her first six years were filled with the life of a child growing up on a farm in north central South Dakota, a life that was very exciting and very hard.

In July 1923, Irene developed polio. She had a fever, and when her mother told her to hold up her arm, she couldn't do it, nor could she stand. At

first she was treated locally, but later a doctor who was also a Shriner referred Irene to the new Shriners Hospital in Minnesota.

Irene spent six months in the Minnesota Shriners Hospital. Her mother found a job in Minneapolis, which enabled her to visit her daughter every day, while back home, Irene's grandmother took care of her siblings while her father worked. Eventually, Irene recovered the use of her right leg and strength in her right hand, but her right arm remained paralyzed.

When she returned home to South Dakota, Irene had completely missed second grade. She had to work very hard to catch up and experienced many challenges. As time went on, Irene adjusted to her new life and learned how to do things differently.

After graduating from high school, Irene was in the first graduating class at the new Eastern Montana College in Billings, Montana, where she earned her teaching degree. She taught school for one year before marrying and starting her family — Irene and her husband, Byron, had eight children. Her kids say it was understood that they all would get college degrees, and they all did, and so did all of her grandchildren.

Throughout her busy and accomplished life, Irene and her family never forgot the Shriners. Her son, David, who worked for Wells Fargo Bank, helped Shriners Hospitals with financial investments. Another son, Dean, dreamed of playing in the Montana East-West Shrine Football Game. While that dream did not come true for Dean, both of his sons, as well as his grandson, were selected to play in the game.



Four generations of Irene's family were positively affected by the care she received as a little girl at the new hospital in Minnesota. Today, Shriners Hospitals for Children has improved the lives of more than 1.4 million children. We are pleased to wish Irene a happy 103rd birthday and send her warm wishes for a safe and healthy year.
